Guildford Hotel

Members of the "Save the Guildford Hotel Action Group" and the Guildford Association have recently been in contact with staff at the Heritage Council and with Mr Luke Martinovich - co-owner of the Hotel. Mr Martinovich also sent a written update dated 16 June 2009.

The update indicates that the owners expect to have final reports on the scope and cost of reinstatement of the hotel by the end of June. These reports will then be considered carefully by the owners and the insurers.

We have learnt that the owners had expected to be much further ahead by now however several key professionals involved with preparing reports on the Guildford Hotel damage were redeployed into providing assistance to those affected by the Victorian bushfires.

An engineer, who was commissioned by the owners to assess the burnt-out structure, has issued a report which we understand from the owner's update has commented that the building will not be [further adversely] affected by one season of wet weather. The community's concern about the very large basement under the hotel becoming waterlogged during the winter has been passed onto senior Heritage Council staff who have indicated that they will look into the matter.

The owners have explained that they are now seeking appointments to meet the Acting Director of the Heritage Council and the Chief Executive Officer of the City of Swan. They have also commented that they are proposing to approach the State and possibly also Federal Governments for assistance.

2009 - Year of the Sugar Gums

Activities for this important year are continuing. We are pleased to announce that the City of Swan has agreed to the installation of a public art piece to mark the 10th anniversary of the greement between them and the Guildford community to preserve the iconic gums in James itreet. Many of you will recall a previous gift of a bench (1999) however it unfortunately did iot withstand the vandals. The new piece, ironwork by a noted local artist, will no loubt generate a great deal of interest and discussion in the community. The artist will xamine the archives held on the trees, including the public campaign to save them and roduce an interpretative work. A display currently in the Guildford Library as part of the 'oetry and Art competition provides very interesting historical background to the trees.

The Poetry and Art competition held in collaboration with the National Trust of Australia has losed with more than 60 entries. Judging by an independent panel commences shortly nd presentation of awards, sponsored by the Guildford Association will take place at 5.30 m on July 30 at Woodbridge House where the entries will be displayed. Prize money of 600 has been provided by the Association with an overall prize of a framed pastel of the sugar Gums generously donated by the noted artist, Drewfus Gates.

Regrettably our application for funding to undertake Banner Making Workshops struck trong competition for limited funds and we were unsuccessful.

Friday August 14 brings another memorable anniversary – the candle lit dinner in James street (1999) attended by so many and visited by Professor David Bellamy. A campfire has seen organised for Stirling Square for those who would like to bring along some comforts and sit around the fire and reminisce. It gets underway at sundown.

Early November will bring an end to our anniversary celebrations with a major community event in Stirling Square to unveil the public art piece and install the accompanying time apsule - more on that closer to the day.

Guildford's Royal Show Connection

2009 is another celebratory year for our town .It is 175 years since the first Cattle Show was held by the Agricultural Society in Guildford, in November 1834. This show was the start of the Agricultural Shows and the forerunner of our present Royal Show. The first show day commenced with the Governor touring farms in the neighbourhood of Guildford, inspecting cattle, and awarding prizes to shepherds and servants. Members of the Society concluded the day with a dinner for 48 persons held at the Cleikum Inn, West Guildford (now known as Bassendean).

The show grounds were located on several sites in Guildford, including the river foreshore near the present Bassendean Bridge, the Railway Reserve opposite the Guildford Hotel and then to land now occupied by Fauntleroy Park, James Street. The Royal Show relocated from the Guildford Showgrounds to Claremont in 1905.

1990 was the centenary of the granting of the royal letters patent to the title – Royal Agricultural Society. This occasion was honoured in Guildford with a large street procession, a mini show, a morning tea presented by the CWA and the unveiling of a plough donated by the Royal Agricultural Society. An interesting feature of the old show grounds site, is the large sugar gum tree standing on the north boundary (Swan Street), this was one of two trees planted at the original entrance to the Show Grounds. This entrance was adjacent to the Woodbridge Railway Station and formed the main entry for visitors and livestock. Today this magnificent tree stands as a living celebration of Guildford's landscape and social history. (*Prepared by B.Dundas*)
